LiDA Entry Information Guide

Further guidance for your entry, and what the judges are looking for.....

- 1. Put yourself in the position of a judge who has to choose outstanding, worthy-of-merit awards, from 30 entries. How would you go about it?
- 2. The entries must answer, or at least acknowledge, <u>all</u> the information requested in the entry guidance notes. For instance, wrong presentation or use of flashlight photography or "Photoshop" is likely to disqualify the entry.
- 3. Criteria that is not addressed, leaves speculation and uncertainty for the judges. Be honest and detail the shortfalls <u>but</u> always explain why they could not be improved. The judges will understand.
- 4. Rooting out the required information can be frustrating for the judges and can take too much time to consider each entry if hidden in overly verbose text.
- 5. The National Lighting Design Awards have been successful in fostering good lighting design, however, to achieve an award, we to look for something a little above good design.
- 6. Select a project that has plenty of scope. If there are very few luminaires, usually the scope is small. This is especially challenging with residential lighting.
- 7. The successful entry must demonstrate a genuinely unusual *challenge or difficulty* and how this was overcome.
- 8. The lighting should first address the task. If there is inadequate lighting to complete the task, the entry will be flawed.
- 9. Then, the lighting should address the architecture or interior design and how they have been enhanced. This is *not* an award for good architectural or interior design. A pretty picture does not automatically earn a merit award.
- 10. Has the lighting provided the required ambience or atmosphere?
- 11. A brief summary of the challenge in the first paragraph is a great help to drawing the judges into examining an entry more closely.
- 12. Be aware the judges are aware that digital photographs can be readily altered from what exists. Be honest in your presentation!
- 13. Although incidental to judging, for your own sake, it is wise to provide acknowledgements to all involved in the project!
